For this first assignment, first and foremost, think of yourself as a writer, a storyteller.

Start (and end) by asking questions:

- How can work achieve meaning? What techniques are used to achieve meaning?
- Are there other meanings that can be leveraged to support and reinforce the main theme or meaning? What are the sub-themes?
- Who is my intended audience?
- What am I trying to convey thematically? Dramatically?
- Why should anyone care? Where's the relevance? Does my work beat the "so what" factor? Does it matter?



Although this is a creative assignment, unlike the expository research assignments you will be writing later, you will still need to come up with a creative "perspective" (not totally unlike a thesis) in the introductory graph of your story. You need to plant seeds, make the reader pay want to pursue what it is you have to say.



The "Me" assignment and the submersion assignment can be written in first person. The stories "Out West: Growing Up Hard" by Joe Wilkins in The Best Magazine Writing: 2010 is a great example to turn to for the Me assignment. There are a number of great examples in Harper's collection Submersion Journalism: Reporting in the Radical First Person.
